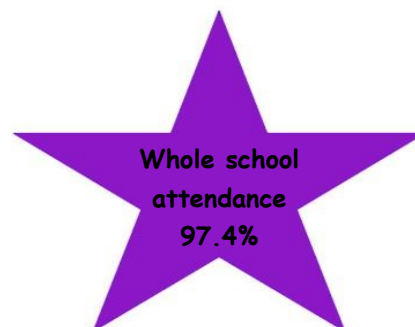

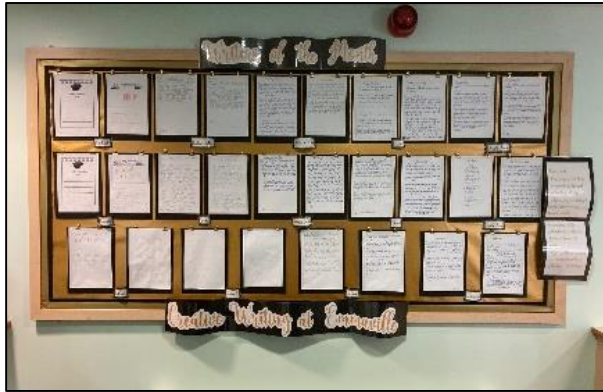

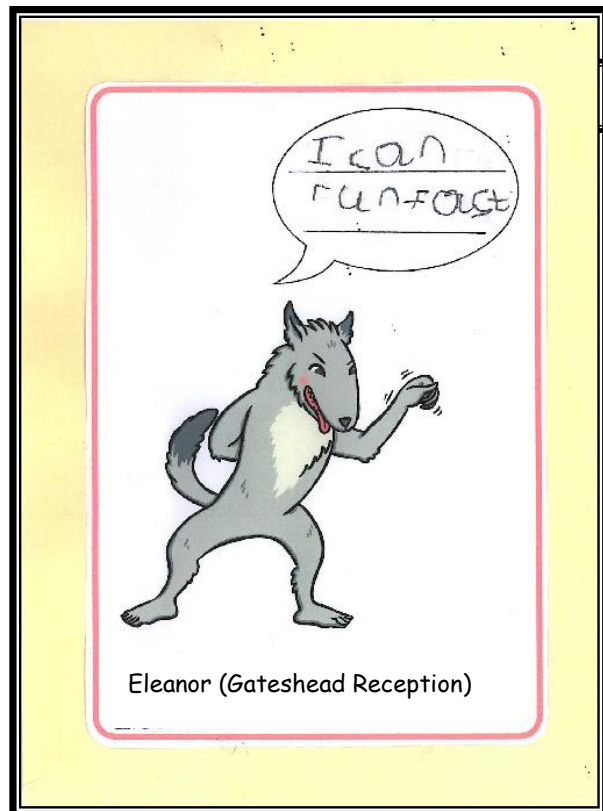


Adventure at Wicked Wild Forest

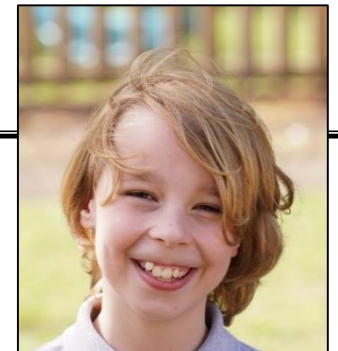
I could help by being able to hold my own parliament, administer my own taxes and mint my own coins. All this money will go to you and the new army. It won't cost you an extra penny.

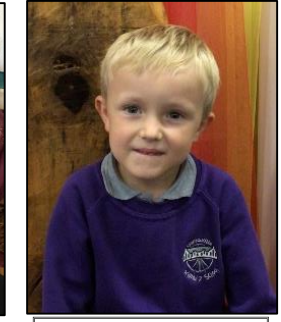

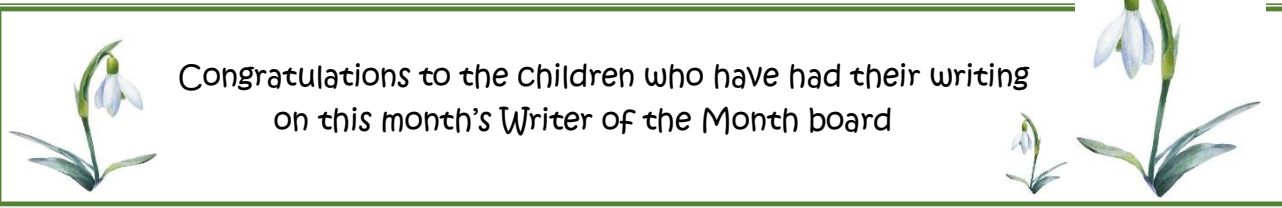

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Parents' Evening updates for KS1 and KS2

Dear Parents/Carers,

We are looking forward to welcoming you into school for parents' evening after the half term holidays. You will be able to make bookings for these appointments on Friday 17th February; here is a reminder of the dates for each year group.

As ever, this will be an opportunity to discuss your child's attainment and progress, as well as their wellbeing in school. At each appointment, you will receive an interim report about your child which shows an indicator of their attitude in key areas such as behaviour and effort, as well as their attainment and target areas in maths, reading and writing.

At Emmaville, we have been in the process of reviewing our assessment policy and making some changes to how we assess and report attainment throughout the year.

Previously, in the Autumn and Spring term, your child would have been assessed as WTS (working towards the standard), EXS (expected standard) or GDS (greater depth standard). However, this terminology will now only be used for the children's end of year reports, once the whole year's curriculum has been taught.

On your child's interim report, you will see that they have been assessed under the following headings.

My Maths Assessment			
Beginning to develop year group expectations	Embedding understanding of year group expectations	Securely demonstrates application of year group expectations	Deeper understanding of year group expectations

Each academic year, this will allow the children the opportunity to make progress through that year's programme of study, and also allow them time to fully embed the new content areas that come with a new year group.

If you have any questions regarding this, please don't hesitate to discuss this with your child's class teacher at your appointment.
