




Welcome back everyone. We have a busy 7-week term ahead with many exciting festive events planned for the children.



The task for this piece of writing was to write an information report. In geography the Year 5 children have been learning about Biomes. Enjoy reading Amelia's report which includes technical vocabulary, interesting facts with detail that captures the interest of the reader.

#### The Taiga Biome

The taiga biome (which is also known as Boreal or Coniferous Forest) is the world's largest terrestrial biome. The taiga biome is located below the tundra and temperate deciduous forest. The taiga forms a band across North America, Europe, Asia and Russia. Taiga is named after the Russian word taiga, meaning land of little sticks.

#### Human Process

Most of taiga is uninhabited by humans but there are surprisingly a few major cities in taiga such as Toronto and Moscow. Taiga is endangered due to logging (chopping down trees), mining and tar sand production. Logging in taiga is terrible because the growing season is short. The taiga is popular with cyclists, hikers, canoeists and campers. This could make people want to keep harming taiga and building more camps and hiking sites.

#### <u>Animals</u>

In the winter most of the animals hibernate (like bears and chipmunks) or migrate (like Canada geese or caribou) further south to find food. You would usually think there were no animals in taiga but your wrong. There are actually many animals in taiga that had adapted to the cold harsh weather. Summer conditions attracts many insects to the porals and bogs in the taiga, so birds migrate to taiga. Up to 3 to 5 million birds (mostly songbirds) migrate to taiga to feed off all the insects. Some of the birds have specially adapted feathers to have the ability to change colour for winter or summer.

#### <u>Plants</u>

Plants in taiga rarely grow because the growing season is short and almost lasts 3 months of the year. Plants only grow in the summer. As a rule, they have to grow together in clusters to survive the cold harsh weather so they don't get torn apart. Since the growing season is short there's very little variety of plants. The majority of plants are conifers, grass, flowers and mushrooms. Conifers are evergreens and don't lose their needles like their leaves in the winter so there are very few nutrients in the soil.

#### **Conclusion**

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




We will be celebrating and raising money for Children in Need on Friday 17<sup>th</sup> November!
