














### Emmaville Gets Active...

The 'Youth Sports Trust' has identified the need for children to be more physically active. Did you know that it is recommended that children are active for 60 minutes EVERY day? It is the responsibility of schools to provide 30 out of these 60 minutes within the school day.

#### The Challenge

Children are spending less time moving and more time sitting! This type of sedentary behaviour has a significant impact on the long term health of young people, with hardened arteries and inflammation becoming common in children aged just six years old. Engaging parents and families to ensure children are taking part in active play to develop their physical literacy is vital if we want to flip the increasing trend of children using digital devices instead of moving around.

#### The Government Ambition

The childhood obesity plan is the government's response to the challenge of growing inactivity and physical wellbeing in young people.

The guidelines of the plan detail the responsibility of schools to not only ensure 30 active minutes each day for every child in school, but their responsibility to proactively encourage parental engagement to achieve 30 active minutes outside of the timetabled school day.

#### The Benefit

Daily physical activity is vital for young people's cognitive and psycho-social development. Schools have a responsibility to engage parents in ensuring every child has the confidence and competence to move and is included in daily physical activity.

To create a lasting benefit to children's health, regular movement and reduced sitting time have to become part of the long-term fabric of their day, inside and outside of school and not just restricted to physical education.

Here at Emmaville, we value this drive to get children more active. Not only do we offer two PE lessons each week, from reception through to Year 6, but we encourage children to be active through e.g. active travel to and from school, entry into competitions and festivals, varied after school and lunch time sports clubs, in school coaching and sports taster workshops, links to local sports clubs, movement breaks during and between lessons, active playtimes and when the weather improves 'regular runs' around the school grounds.

This academic year, we have been on a mission to get children even more active at playtimes. With the help of the children throughout school as well as our fabulous 'Young Sports Leaders', a wish list of playground equipment was ordered. We're pleased to say that finally it arrived last week and it has without a doubt been like Christmas for all of our children.

Equipment is accessed on both yards during morning and lunch time playtimes. The children have been super excited and it has been so lovely to see them not only being really active but also to see them really enjoying themselves and playing so well with one another. We're very proud of them for taking such good care of it too - keep up the great work everyone!


#### Year 4 Easter Performances

We are sure all of the pupils will make us extremely proud. Hankies at the ready!






