

I hope you have all had a good week so far.

Changes to the school day for Reception and Key Stage 1 pupils

The Department for Education have issued guidance stating that all primary school children should spend a minimum of 32.5 hours a week in school. All primary schools in England are expected to have this in place by September 2023.

Currently, at Emmaville, pupils in Key Stage 2 (Year 3 - Year 6) do spend 32.5 hours in school. However, pupils in the Reception class and in Key Stage 1 (Year 1 & Year 2) do not. It is therefore the school's intention to increase the school day for the Reception and Key Stage 1 children. The new start and finish times for these children, highlighted below, will begin when we return to school after the October half-term holiday (Monday 31st October 2022).

Pupil start and finish times are staggered. This is to help with traffic congestion at the beginning and end of the school day.

Reception pupils - 9am - 3.30pm

Year 1 pupils - 8.45am - 3.15pm

Year 2 pupils - 8.55am - 3.25pm

Year 3 pupils - 8.45am - 3.15pm (32.5 hours)

Year 4 pupils - 8.55am - 3.25pm (32.5 hours)

Year 5 pupils - 8.45am - 3.15pm (32.5 hours)

Year 6 pupils - 8.55am - 3.25pm (32.5 hours)

Please note that pupils in Key Stage 2 may walk around to the front yard at the end of the school day if it makes it easier for parents/carers who may be collecting children from Key Stage 1.

What have you been doing at school today?

We all pose this question to our children and I bet the majority of responses are - 'Nothing'. Well, let me tell you, your children have been working very hard in school.

This week we had our school governors visit us; they were incredibly impressed with the learning that was taking place. The governors spent time in classrooms observing lessons, they were able to chat to the children about what they were learning, and the feedback from the visit was extremely positive. Well done to our amazing teachers and our amazing children!

If you are eager to find out what your child has been learning each week, then the class pages on the school website are a great source of information.

However, this week...

If your child is in reception class, ask them to tell you a few facts about sharks.

In Year 1, the children have been learning all about the city of London.

Ask the Year 2 children about the artist Brian Pollard.

In geography, the Year 3 children have been finding out about rivers. Mr Purvis was impressed with the way they have been taught to remember the processes of erosion and deposition.

The Year 4 children are really knowledgeable about aspects of electricity, particularly closed and open circuits. Biomes have been introduced in Year 5.

Finally, the Year 6 children should be able to discuss at great length the things they learned from their recent visit to the Victoria Tunnel.


The children have been learning many other things too, but those are just some starting points for discussions with your children. Happy chatting!


