


The children in Key Stage 2 are currently participating in the COVID Community Champions initiative. The following is information about the 12-month project.



Public Health Gateshead have already established a network of adult volunteers who are Covid Community Champions.

COVID Community Champions

- help ensure people across Gateshead hear correct and consistent information about the Coronavirus developments.
- help Public Health gather insight about what's working well in our communities and what is not.

COVID Junior Champions

We are looking to create a network of "Covid Junior Champions" across Gateshead who can become involved in this work. We are creating age-appropriate training in the form of 3 animated videos and activities with initial development focus on key stage 2 children.

- to give children the simple, key knowledge and understanding about covid-19.
- to give children positive actions to follow to become part of the champions team.
- alter the current isolation felt by children to encourage them to be part of a new team.
- encouragement of grownups getting the vaccine and to introduce this as the best way of getting back to a new normal.
- messaging to be directed to children but to have some focus on the adult requirements like vaccines and hands, face, space, fresh air.
- all information and guidance given in the videos has been approved by Gateshead Public Health.

Information format:

The animated videos and creative script have been designed to incorporate information from the current adult programme modules. These modules have been changed into "missions" to work alongside the "mission possible" theme developed for primary children.

We will be introducing a new animated character to be used throughout all 3 video missions. This character will be relatable to primary aged children to ensure engagement. And all topics will be delivered in a reassuring, positive manner.

Children will have the opportunity to complete the 3 short video training missions designed to give a clear insight into the following:

- **Mission 1:** what is coronavirus/understanding how it infects people/symptoms
- **Mission 2:** good hand hygiene/social distance/ self-isolation/family bubbles
- **Mission 3:** what are vaccinations and testing

All 3 mission requirements:

- ✓ Watch the video (5 mins)
- ✓ Learn the key messages
- ✓ Complete the mini task (all resources provided)
- ✓ Gain mission accomplished sticker to add to their ID badge.

The overall objective - Children to work as cadets throughout each mission and once the 3 missions are complete the children become - COVID Junior Champions

This will be part of a 12-month project and give continued support in the form of updated information, activities, and monthly newsletters.

The videos

- Each class bubble to watch the 3 short videos consecutively over the space of 1-2 weeks and complete the 3 applicable activities.
- All group activities to be kept within the class bubble setting; however, participation from all of key stage 2 to encourage an overall school programme.

Mission 1 - Understanding Coronavirus

Task: To Personalise Mission ID Badge with secret code name and hand draw their official photo.



Mission 2 – Keeping Safe

Task: To use stickers to personalise Covid Champion water bottle with code name or covid safety words.



Mission 3 – Understanding Vaccinations

Task: Learn sign language for 'stop coronavirus' direction for this provided within video animation.

Optional - Design a 'stop the spread of coronavirus' safety poster



Benefits :-

- School participation in the COVID junior champions programme to be seen as encouraging children to play a part in the fight against covid19.
- Highlighted during our steering group session was the fact children are feeling quite segregated due to the necessary safety bubbles and this would be a good opportunity for the children to partake in one programme together. Individual schools could choose to update their social media to enable all classes involved see each other's designs.
- Children having this information and relaying elements back to grown-ups will work towards a healthier wellbeing within the wider community.
- to give children the tools to make good choices. To keep them safe, healthy and to avoid isolation periods and further school closures.




